DMHDD 2ND QUARTERLY ADVANCE

The Division ofMental Health and Developmental Disabilities is processing the 2nd, 3rd and 4th quarterly advances in two parts in order to expedite delivery of grant funds to grantees. - * Agency Grant Funding form which lists all other federal, state and municipal grant support for projects funded by DH&SS grants (Due by 11/01/01)
- * If you are providing residential and/or critical care services, certification that a Board-approved emergency response & recovery plan is on file at the agency (Due by 9/30/01)

* Compliance with all special conditions which were set out as a condition of grant award.

Please be advised that if you are providing only AYI services, the above listed ARORA requirements apply as well as the documents pertaining to AYI billing.

CMHC'S START UP TELEPSYCH PROJECTS

ACMHSA providers should place telepsychiatry on their radar screens and speak to Leonard Abel, Ph.D. if you are interested in site development work.

Under a grant from the AMHTA, Department of Corrections will link to identify CMHC's with POTS-VTC units. The equipment operates thru regular phone lines. The purpose of the initial demonstration project will require the identified CMHC to perform an intake assessment to the DOC inmate who requires psychiatric follow-up prior to release.

Initial sites include Kotzebue, Nome, Bethel, South Central Counseling, and Ketchikan. A second tier of this demonstration project will utilize Polycom high bandwidth equipment. API will install both units and the Division is interested to pilot rural sites with consistent referral patterns to API. Rural providers will receive an overview of the project during the Rural Mental Health Conference in Anchorage November 26 - December 1, 2001.

To their credit, Walter Majoros and Leonard Abel are moving this project along quickly, and CMHC's should identify interest as soon as possible. In yet another pilot demonstration project, Ketchikan is scheduled to bring up the high bandwidth child telepsych demonstration linking Metlakatla, and Ketchikan with a board certified child psychiatrist at Bartlett. The project should be up and running during the first week in November 2001.

Movers and shakers behind the scenes are clearly Jeff Jesse, AMHTA Executive Director and Bill Worrall, MD, psychiatrist with DOC.

ACMHSA-FORAKER GROUP MAKE CONNECTION

Dennis McMillian of the Foraker Group and ACMHSA has agreed, in principle, to bring training and technical support to ACMHSA members. Initial focus will be development of Board fiscal policy; development of key

financial indicators (normative operating reserves, current ratio, etc.); and core competencies in financial and administrative management.

The second phase of this initiative will be the development of a CMHC-Senior Management Boot Camp to augment the ACMHSA quarterly meetings.

Kick off is scheduled for November 12, 2001 at 1:30 PM and CMHC's are encouraged to have the finance and clinical officers present for the afternoon session.
